# What Do You Need to Graduate?

Remember this saying:

"Take Good Care Thinking Uniquely"

Take - Total credits 124

Good - General education credit 47

Care – Core credits required for your major (varies)

Thinking – Track required credits (varies)

**Uniquely – Upper division credits (minimum of 40 credits)** 

All graduates need a minimum of 124 credits of which 47 - 49 credits are for your General Education (you know the fun stuff like Basic Math and Critical Thinking). Below, in Chart 1: General Education Guidelines, you will notice three broad areas of Tier 1, Tier 2 and Tier 3. For Tier 1 you take all the classes listed. You have numerous choices in Tiers 2 and 3, with Tier 3 being mainly related to your Major.

Tier 3 includes a requirement for your Capstone or final major class. For the Fine Arts Major this includes either a Major Art Show, a Music Recital, or a final Theater Production. For Communication and Media, the Capstone class is Current Issues in Communication and Society. Charts 2 – 7 are your major and track specific classes. More on that below.

In your second to last semester, fill out Form 1: Application for Undergraduate Degree Form and submit to the Registrar's department with the required payment. They will analyze your transcript and let you know decisively what is needed in your last semester.

It is important to regularly meet with your Faculty Advisor to ensure you have an academic plan that you follow. This will help you graduate in a timely fashion. It is never a good idea to self-advise.

This form is also used for changing a major or choosing a minor. Your major's faculty advisor is usually not able to help you with figuring out the minor's schedule. So be ready to speak to that discipline's faculty for advice on the minor.

## **Advisement Materials**

#### **Overview of Advisement Sheets and Advisement Checklist**

Below are Charts 2 -8. Chart 2 is the Individual Academic Plan. You can use Chart 2 to keep track of potential classes as you go through 3-8, whic are specific to your major. For example, if you are a Communication and Media major and planning to pursue the Communication Studies Track, you will follow Chart 2. If you are wanting to do the Public Relations Track, you would focus on Chart 3. You can also explore double tracking or double majoring.

Note the color scheme: Light Orange means all semesters, Blue is Fanuchanan (Fall). Green, Fañomnåkan (Spring), Yellow for Summer classes and Dark Orange for intersession, between Fall and Spring. Also, you will see that at the top of all the charts are the Major's core requirements. These will be standard for a major and will not change between a major's track.

Always discuss your ideas, concerns, or questions with your faculty advisors. We are here and happy to help. And we do not bite.

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


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
