


Geography Program

Re-Launch of the Geographic Information Learning Laboratory









As aspiring and in-service CHamoru teachers, the students completed handouts from the Guampedia website as they went through the museum. The handouts were part of the online resources which teachers could use to engage their students with the museum exhibits.

Hinanao (Field Trip) to Hale'-ta Farm











In May, Dr. Kisha's CM412 and CMED481 classes went to the Hale'-ta Farm in Talo'fo'fo'. The farm is owned and maintained by the Quinata family. The students were able to engage in a workday, planting about 150 birenghenas (eggplant), pulling weeds around hundreds of donne' (pepper) plants, and feeding the egg-laying mannok (chickens).

Environmental Data Collection with UOG Geography



At the Conference on Island Sustainability in April, Dr. Jose Edgardo Aban, a professor of Geography, discussed how the UOG Geography Program utilizes geographic information systems (GIS) and satellite remote sensing technology to determine the effects of forest fires on the environment. Localizing environmental mapping tools makes it easier and faster for local agencies to collect information on natural resources such as burnt grasslands and watersheds.


























46TH ANNUAL RESEARCH CONFERENCE




Pacific Asia Inquiry Vol. 15 2024/2025
