- be grammatically correct and free of spelling errors (1 point)

#### **Examinations**

There will be three exams throughout the semester. The final examination for this class is scheduled for Monday, May 19<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 am. Your final examination will not be cumulative. Make-up exams will only be given under *extreme* circumstances.

#### **Research Paper**

You will be assigned to write one ten to fifteen (10-12) page research paper about an approved topic.

#### **Oral Presentation**

A twenty (20) minute oral presentation based on the topic of your research paper is to be given towards the end of the semester.

#### **Attendance and Participation**

Regular class attendance is required and class participation is highly encouraged. You will be allowed three unexcused absences during the semester. Thereafter, .5 will be deducted from your final grade for each unexcused absence. Please have the appropriate reading assignments completed **before** each class meeting. Your attendance and participation will be a deciding factor in determining grades on the borderline.

#### **Grading:**

Your grade for the course will be calculated as follows:
