PARTICIPATION The arts are collaborative and participatory. You are expected to attend every

class meeting and complete the activities each day. If you cannot attend class, you may submit an alternate assignment. Usually, this will be viewing a video

(of my choice) and writing a 250-word response to that video.

HYBRID This is hybrid course. We meet 90 minutes in-person each week and you are

expected to engage in online learning activities every week. There will generally be a discussion thread on the upcoming topic, readings and links to study, and a

review/validation of some sort of the material covered the prior week.

FINAL PRESENTATION On the Friday of exam week, May 21, the portfolio presentation to faculty, will

STUDENT LEARNING This course is the capstone academic course in the Fine Arts program. You will

generally be showcasing work produced in prior classes, or activities outside of college courses. The goal of the course is to make your presentation of yourself

and your work as professional as possible.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will successfully be able to:

- 1. Prepare a CAHA Grant Application;
- 2. Prepare an Artist's Statement and Biography;
- 3. Prepare a Resume;
- 4. Understand how to apply for internships, graduate schools, and a variety of job announcements in the arts;
- 5. Evaluate their own body of work in the construction of an artist's portfolio;
- 6. Place their professional materials on a public-facing website; and
- 7. Present their work in front of all Fine Arts faculty.

PROJECTS

Artist's Statement (10 points). Students will create an Artist's Statement as well as an Artist's Biography. These are used in Exhibitions (for visual artists) and program notes (for performing artists).

Resume (10 points). Students will create an Artist's Resume featuring their accomplishments in art, music, and theatre, contextualizing other work experience, and making it aesthetically pleasing.

Letter of Interest. (20 points). Students will create a 500-word letter expressing interest for an Internship, graduate school, or posted job announcement.

Grant Application (20 points). Students will complete a CAHA Fellowship Grant Application with the following required elements: (1) resume, artist's bio, a 250-word project description, and a \$500 itemized budget. The samples of work will coincide with the portfolio project below.

Portfolio (20 points). Students will compile a portfolio of work with samples of 10-15 of the best images of work created in the last six years. This body of work is not limited to work at UOG. These images will be properly labeled, according to the track of the student. (This will be discussed further in class.)

Website (10 points). Students will transfer all images from the portfolio on to a free webpage hosting platform like Wix, WordPress, or something like this. In addition to the portfolio works, the student's artists statement (or bio) and a link to their resume is required.
