COURSE SYLLABUS - Spring 2025

A. CREDITS 1

- **B.** COURSE DESCRIPTION: The Jazz Band will provide ensemble, sectional, and solo experience in a jazz combo format. Improvisational skills will be encouraged. Idioms included are Dixieland, Latin, Swing, Shuffle, Rock, Funk, Ballad, and Blues.
- **C. PREREQUISITES:** Members in Jazz Band should have a basic knowledge and skills on their instrument, and may be auditioned, if necessary, to demonstrate basic playing skills and to define chair placement within the band.
- **D. PROCEDURES:** Rehearsals are Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4:00 to 5:20p.m. Additional rehearsals will be arranged based upon need and member agreement.
- **E. POLICIES:** Attendance is necessary for Jazz Band if the ensemble is to become a quality group. Schedule conflicts should be kept to a minimum. The schedule in this syllabus is considered sufficient notice of required performance dates. Plan early to avoid conflicts.
- F. TEXT BOOKS AND OTHER REFERENCES: All music will be provided.
- **G. LEARNING OBJECTIVES:** By the end of the course students will demonstrate the ability to:
- 1) Perform the selected music in a manner that reflects an understanding of the jazz style appropriate to the selection.
- 2) Demonstrate an understanding of Latin, swing, shuffle, rock, funk, ballad, and blues musical styles.
- 3) Experiment with jazz improvisation through use of scale techniques.
- **H. INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGIES:** Each student will participate directly in music performances, receiving positive musical direction from the director.
