Course Description

This course provides group instruction in the fundamentals of keyboard technique. Topics addressed in class include correct playing techniques, reading music, music theory, and the development of good practice habits. Homework will be comprised of a few written assignments and short playing assignments. *Access to a piano or keyboard for these assignments is mandatory.*

REQUIRED/CLASSROOM MATERIALS:

- Text
- Pencil
- Folder: all sheet music and worksheets received should be kept in folder.
- Students may be required to bring their own headphone with ¼" adapter

ATTENDANCE:

Students are allowed to a maximum of 3 "free" absences during the semester. **These days are set aside for possible illnesses, social obligations, official duties, job interviews, or any other events you must attend to, so use them wisely.**

After 3 free absences, your final semester grade will be deducted 5 points for each extra-unexcused absence. If you have 7 absences or more, your final semester grade will be F.

Students are expected to come to class on time. **Missing 10 minutes of a class (by either arriving late or leaving early) will be viewed as a ½ absence.**
