COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is designed to improve music aural comprehension for music majors and minors. Ear Training II is predominantly concerned with the recognition of 7th and 9th chords, complex rhythms, melodic and chord transcriptions and advanced sight singing. Computer software will be used as part of the training.

PREQUISITES: Instructor's permission required or successful completion of MU170 Ear Training I.

COURSE GOALS: This is a course in developing your skills in listening to and understanding music. Your acquisition of these skills is measured in two ways: (1) your ability to vocally reproduce melodies and rhythms (2) your ability to accurately transcribe musical patterns upon hearing it. You will be tested in each of these areas in class by singing in class, taking dictation quizzes, exams, a midterm and a final. Everyone will be heard singing in class on a regular basis. Keep in mind: this is *not* a course in singing; we will not discuss vocal technique in any meaningful detail, and you will not be evaluated on your vocal quality.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: By the end of the course, students will demonstrate proficiency in the following areas of ear training:

- Melodic and rhythmic dictation
- Intervals
- Common scales
- Modes
- Chord structures
- Solfeggio
- Clef reading

COURSE REQUIRMENTS:

- 1. **ATTENDANCE**. Daily attendance is essential and expected. Concepts are cumulative and absences will increase the difficulty of the course. Students should contact the instructor prior to any planned absence. Exams and quizzes can be made up for excused absences only; excusing an absence is left to the discretion of the instructor. Absences due to illness require a note signed by a doctor or nurse.
- 2 **EVALUATION.**
 - Singing: 50% (in-class singing 25%, midterm 12.5%, final exam 12.5%).
 - Dictation/Computer Assignments: 50% (in-class quizzes 25%, midterm 12.5%, final exam 12.5%)
 - **IMPORTANT:** in order to pass the course you must earn a passing grade in **both** the singing and dictation portions of the course. Singing: 50% (in-class singing 25%, midterm 12.5%, final exam 12.5%). You are responsible for learning and coming to class prepared to sing any assigned material.
