Syllabus

1. Course Description

CM202 Chamoru 4 is the fourth semester, 2nd year course Chamoru language. It is an intermediate course for students who completed CHamoru 1, 2, and 3. Emphasis is on the CHamoru language orthography affixes; prefixes, suffixes, Circumfixes, infixes and benefactive,

focus system structures in CHamoru. The students are expected to learn and further develop and their proficiency on the following skills; listening, reading, writing and speaking in Chamoru. CM202 is a continuation of CM101, 102 and 201. Emphasis is on improving and adding on to the oral-aural competency.

11. Course Content

CHamoru 4 continues to develop the sounds and patterns of the CHamoru language and the vocabulary building processes continuous which includes numerous 2-3 tier CHamoru words from the following themes: Salutations and departing expressions, the calendar, division of the day, classroom objects, numbers, common day expressions, village names, time words, pronouns, kinship terms, cultural cooking, eating implements, location words, common adjectives, and

question words and other content areas. These vocabularies are incorporated into more complex dialogues, students are expected to learn and memorize

111. Language

The course allows students the opportunity to combine these vocabulary items to write a report using more complex, accurate use of the CHamoru orthography, write personal experience sentences by formulating prepositional, adjectival and verbal phrases; simple to complex yes/no and either/or questions and responses negative and positive sentences with intensifier, grammatical rules on singular, dual and plural subjects; the possessive pronouns, morphophonemic changes, reduplication; plural formation; vowel harmony; past and present progressive tenses.

- 1. Develop and increase students vocabulary
- 2. Employ the CHamoru language in their everyday conversation and storytelling
- 2. Develop students ability to listen, read, write and speak CHamoru Knowledge of various CHamoru culture, traditions and values

- 1. Listen, read and understand basic CHamoru sentences, paragraphs into short stories
- 2. Write and speak complex CHamoru sentences into paragraphs.

- 5. Demonstrate and understanding on various CHamoru traditions, culture and values
