COURSE OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this course will be to introduce to students the fundamental perspectives in the human science of sociology through instruction in methods of sociological research as well as the central theories, explanations and issues that sociologists use to investigate and interpret human social life. Research methods, both quantitative and qualitative, are explicated throughout the course to help students appreciate how sociologists understand human society in a systematic way. In exploring findings of sociological research in such subjects as politics, the economy, ethnicity, gender, economic development and globalization, among other topics, the course instructs students in the scientific methods that sociologists use, such as secondary analysis, participant-observational studies, survey research, and human experiments.

COURSE ORGANIZATION

This course will consist of a combination of approaches that are intended to aid the student in approaching and entering the study of society. The approaches will include Moodle lectures and presentations which are Asynchronous (this means they are recorded), course readings, and films. Students will watch the assigned lectures and presentations each week and take notes. There are a series of assigned movies and presentations. These can be found on Youtube. The movies and presentations are listed in the syllabus. There are four tests during the semester. Each student will take the assigned test on the assigned test dates. There will be a Synchronous Zoom Meeting (where we meet live on Zoom) before each test for reviewing the material at the listed dates and times. There is a time limit of 90 minutes to complete each test. Each test will cover approximately 22.5% of the course material.

Optional Assignment

For the research paper each student will need to review an article from a Sociological Journal. Suitable choices would include: American Journal of Sociology, Current Sociology, Journal of Applied Sociology, Journal of Sociology: Australian Sociology (to name just a few). The review should include a description of the research findings or discussion, an evaluation of the research methods and the application of one or more theoretical perspectives presented in class to the articles topic. The description, research methods evaluation and theoretical application must be in the student's own words and can not utilize lengthy quotes or paraphrasing.

The optional paper should be five pages in length, typed, and double-spaced. The paper needs to have full bibliographic citations and should not have lengthy quotes. The papers are due before the last week of class.
